Sacramento and East Bay leaders celebrate massive water project that will provide critical water supplies and save limited groundwater supply

What: A celebration of a historic water accord between Sacramento and the East Bay that will lead

to both communities – bitter enemies over the issue of water for more than three decades – getting much needed water supplies. This event marks the beginning of construction of the

"new partnership" project.

When: Monday, May 7, 2007

10 a.m. – 11:30 a.m.

Where: Sacramento River at Freeport; 7760 Freeport Boulevard, Sacramento

■ From the East Bay: I-80 to US-50 East toward Sacramento/South Lake Tahoe. Merge onto I-5 South towards Los Angeles. Exit at Freeport 160/Pocket Road/Meadowview Road. Left at light onto Pocket Road. Drive .25 miles to turn right on Freeport Blvd. Continue .75 miles to the Freeport Intake Facility, on right after underpass

- From North Sacramento: Take I-5 South towards Los Angeles. Follow directions above.
- From South Sacramento: Take I-5 North towards Sacramento. Exit at Pocket Road. Turn right onto Freeport Blvd. and continue .75 miles to the Intake Facility.

Significance: This new, critical supply will protect EBMUD's 1.3 million water customers against a

potentially devastating drought and provide Sacramento with a much-needed supplemental supply. The project is also a national model in developing new water

sources through regional cooperation.
